

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KEEPER'S CORNER - RALPH KRUGLER

Welcome to the Keeper's Corner; a little spot where one of the Hillsboro Lighthouse Keepers gets some recognition.

Samuel Alfred Alexander Berghell was the 1st Head Keeper from March 7, 1909 to August 1, 1911. His life story has not yet been able to be verified, but corroborated by his grandchildren Bob Berghell and Lauren Essex. If the story were true, his life would make a great movie. Here are some highlights.

Born of Viking decent, Alfred was born in Vassa, Finland on December 6, 1865 into a very wealthy family. As a child, he learned to love the sea and with other boys took to crew racing for fun. During those years, Finland was under Russian control and a yearly visitor was Emperor Alexander III. His son, future Tsar, Nicholas II would be given boat rides by Alfred and his friends.

Berghell's father died while he was young and soon the family wealth was gone. His mother was desperate for him to go into anything un-sea related, but Alfred had different ideas. Hoping to show him a life at sea was hard; he was allowed to ride on his older sister's husbands ship. Ditching his quarters for the crew's rooms below, he became a swab and earned the crews respect for his hard work ethic.

Soon he found himself at the Russian Naval Academy, incidentally also housed in Vassa. At the graduation ball, an officer insulted Berghell's date and soon a duel was on. Berghell's sword out-clashed his opponent's, and the shortest victory celebration ended immediately. As he stood over the unconscious Russian, Berghell had to flee or spend life in a Siberian prison. Fortunately, an uncle who was in the Senate was able to procure a passport and before dawn Alfred was on a ship to England.

Becoming a sea Captain, he sailed around the world several times until coming down with an illness that left him near deaf in one ear, broke and recuperating in Australia for three years

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT - KEN HERMAN

2020 – wow! In general, I don't know what I can say about 2020 that probably hasn't already been said. So, I'll try to limit my thoughts to positive accomplishments of the HLPS throughout the year.

2020 started out with a pretty big agenda. First, we started work on the USCG dock and finished the outer section. We also removed most of the lattice work on the dock and replaced it with line - retired from the USCG Cutter Jefferson. We still have the decking from the shore to the end to replace. We hope to do this sometime over the winter season, when it's cooler. This should finish the dock work for the next 5-10 years. I must say that the line that replaced the lattice work looks great!

In February, we had our membership meeting at the Pompano Beach picnic area, just off A1A. It went very smoothly and was a big success. This year, because of COVID, we are planning on moving our membership meeting from Feb. to Dec. 2021. We hope things will be closer to normal by then. See our tour and event schedule for more information.

In March, we held our yearly gala. We made it just under the wire of all the shut-downs due to COVID. It was a roaring success, with better than expected turnout! Thank you to all that participated. The funds made from that event helped glide us nicely through the middle of the year without worries. Plans for the next gala are in the works – stay tuned.

After March, and like everyone else, we shut down tours through September, but we didn't shut down our work on the lighthouse. During that time, we worked on sealing up the lighthouse glass and entry points from water intrusion. This included the diamond glass at the top, all the windows, and the entry door at the bottom. The lighthouse was so porous that every time it rained water would build up at various locations and cause either rust to form or mildew. We have come a long way, but some work still continues. After every rain we inspect the lighthouse and highlight areas that still need further work. Preservation of the lighthouse never stops.

Another project, during the same period, was to put up a new fence on the southern beachhead – over by the barefoot mailman statue. The reason there is a fence is because boaters tend to come up the beach, ignoring the no trespassing signs, and disturb the military personnel staying in the cottages; and generally causing problems. There was some debate as to having a fence. Why? Because a fence tends to kill the view of the coast from the property. For that reason, a sparse and low pole and line fence was decided upon. We are happy to report that the fence is up, looks very nautical and doesn't affect the view negatively.

In Oct., we started our monthly tours back up – with a twist. Because the Hillsboro Club was closed until Dec., they graciously offered to allow car access to the lighthouse for both the Oct. and Nov. tours. What a rare treat!

For all those that don't know, the USCG property is completely surrounded (by land) by the Hillsboro Club property. Because of this, there is very restricted access to the USCG property, with the only unfettered access being by boat. Needless to say, the drive-in tours were a big success.

To re-open, the HLPS obviously had to follow CDC guidelines. Along with the other usual COVID rules, we had implemented the following new rules, specific to the lighthouse:

- 1) Masks must be worn at all times while in the lighthouse
- 2) Travel is only allowed in one direction in the lighthouse
- 3) Disposable gloves are provided – for those that wish to use them
- 4) The lighthouse is limited to 6 individuals at a time

We are happy to report that everyone visiting the lighthouse, to date, has been very respectful of these new rules. It is our goal to try to keep the lighthouse open for visitors, but also keep them as safe as possible. These new rules are designed to do just that.

Dec. marks the return of the boat tours. The boats also have new regulations in place. This includes socially distanced groups, with smaller boat capacities, and masks. Although this is a challenge, we believe that the tours can continue, safely and responsibly.

Finally, let me close with this observation: 2020 has been a challenging year for everyone. But, the HLPS has tried to keep not only our volunteers safe, but also the public who wishes to continue seeing and visiting our important landmark over this unfolding century. We will continue to prosper and move forward despite any obstacles. Be safe, be healthy, and may 2021 be a prosperous year for us all.

He boarded a ship to San Francisco, which of course wasn't a trouble free ride. A fire broke out in the hold and the already near mutinous crew refused the Captains orders. Berghell was able to rally the men, save the ship and arrive at their destination where one grateful passenger gave him his gold watch as a token of his appreciation.

On March 2, 1891 Berghell became a naturalized citizen and in 1896 entered the lighthouse service. He started at Pensacola and had stops at Rebecca Shoal, Dry Tortugas, back to Rebecca Shoal, American Shoal and finally Hillsboro.

During his time at Rebecca Shoal an article was written about Keepers and he was featured. This landed in a New York newspaper where Mary Gertrude Leverich, of a well-to-do family, saw it. Impulsively, she hopped a ship, landed in Key West and later became his wife; much to the lament of her family.

The Berghell's would arrive at the Hillsboro Lighthouse with son Alfred Bayhard Jr (born Sept. 17, 1905) and welcome Maria Ester (May 24, 1907) and Axel Cuthbert (July 26, 1908) who were born at the station.

Berghell's tenure was cut short due to redistricting, a new District Inspector who disliked him, and an Assistant who told him on his first day that he would make his life miserable. That's a long story we'll get into later.



We have quite a bit of historical information on the lighthouse, keepers, families, etc. we're never done collecting more. While I'm not a fan of social media, I use it for research and ignore the bickering. It really is quite amazing how many locals have vintage family photographs of the area. These snapshots of time have provided us with details on our history, shrunk timelines on changes, and challenged our own once thought "facts" which have since been changed.

An example of this comes in this 1950 Eastern Illustrating & Publishing Co. picture postcard. A cursory glance and you might think, "Yup, it's the lighthouse" and move on. However, when you look closer it reveals details that, well let's be honest, most people just don't care about. To us though, details are critical to telling our story accurately and preserving history.


Look closely at the northern side of the base of the tower. What's missing, besides the sea grape? The answer is the original entryway catwalk. We weren't certain when it was removed, as it doesn't appear in the USCG Keepers Logs. With previously available photos, an assumption was made

that the walk had been removed closer to 1960. While this isn't an earth-shattering detail, it is nice to be able to tell our visitors that our entryway has been restored. Plus, with the generous donation of the historically accurate railings by the Skyline Steel Co (Davis family), they now match our historical photos that show them. Next, look up the tower. Again on the northern face another object appears that hasn't been spotted on many other photos. If you see the border where the white and black paint meet, projecting horizontally off the leg is a flagpole. When this was attached and removed will remain uncertain without more help, but we know for sure that it was there in 1950.

Another flagpole appears on the tower in this 1920's photo, but this time it's on the eastern side. Again we don't know the exact date of the photo, but little details narrow it down. For example, the smoke stack on the tower was removed on May 20, 1918, which doesn't appear here. Look off the northern part of the tower and you'll see a triangular United States Light House Service pennant. The U.S.L.H.S. came to an end on July 1, 1939 when the USCG was given control over all US lighthouses. There are more details in there that lead us to believe this photo was taken in the late 1920's, but you get the point.

We collect photos in a variety of ways. Besides family donations, one place I like to look for pictures is on eBay. Just recently a postcard came up that caught my attention. While we already have the image, I always look at the reverse side for information. On a post card occasionally a copyright year will appear, which unfortunately this one does not. Fortunately, there are enough details to label this as an early (1907-1912) range.

You can always hope that it was a circulated card, and the sender included some valuable information. When the card first appeared on eBay, the message side was blank. This kept showing (the seller was asking \$40), so I

ignored it for well over a couple of months.

Then for an unknown reason one morning, I clicked the ad while on my phone. This time the message side had writing, but the odd thing was the advertisement had 3 images. The poster stated the post card was from 1912, which fell into the range we had. The first image was the front of the post card. Advancing on, the second image had uninteresting information where the sender was asking if the recipient was experiencing ill health and some other statements. So why was there a 3rd image? Advancing, another message side appeared, but this time it had a gold mine scrawled upon it. The script was fading in places and difficult to read on a small phone, but the gist of the message was, "This is a view of my station... you will see two residences they are ours. They are just as nice and cozy as can be so come down when you are ready and spend some time with us. Clifton"


This was a jaw dropping moment!

While it's uncertain why the seller had this listed as 1912, if this truly was written by whom I thought. The signature would place the card as having been sent by 1st Assistant Clifton Harry Lopez who served from March 6, 1909 to September 7, 1909. So, 1912 would be a bit late, but it is more difficult to accurately date things than you might think – copyrights/reprints/etc.

A little about the potential sender; Lopez was the oldest of four children, born Christmas Day 1887, and was 22 years old when he arrived at Hillsboro. He was transferred from Rebecca Shoal lighthouse, an off shore light that used to sit off Key West, close to the Dry Tortugas. His family resided on Key West and his brother ventured up to Hillsboro in August to have a fun family get-together. On August 25, Head Keeper Alfred Berghell (another Rebecca Shoal alumni) had taken his family to Palm Beach to visit the dentist. During his absence the Lopez brothers had, well let's say a bit of a spat. How bad did the argument get? Enough for Clifton to get his gun and take 3 shots at his sibling. The details on where (in the cottage or outside) and why still remain a mystery, but what is known is that Berghell was none too pleased upon his return. Berghell demanded that the brother leave immediately and Lopez complied. Clifton then asked permission to accompany his brother back to Key West, to which Berghell agreed. In short order the brothers departed taking Henry Flagler's train south before boarding a ship to complete the journey. Shortly thereafter, Berghell received a letter from Clifton stating he was resigning, and asked that his personal belongings be sent to him. Normally, this would end ones career in the Light House Service, however, Clifton managed to obtain a position back at Rebecca Shoal in 1911 and continued to have a full career in the Service.

LOPEZ CARD (BACK)

Knowing this background, I reached out to the seller explaining the who/what/why we would like this card. Hours passed before a reply came, but it wasn't the response for which I was hoping. Instead this person stated, "Sorry, this was a mistake. That card was sold 2 weeks ago." OK, so the seller had 3 copies of this post card; sold the unused 1st, then sold the 2nd (the gold mine) and now was on the 3rd. I replied that while it would have been great to have the actual card, obviously that was not possible. What was possible was to get a copy of the image of the hand written message. Obviously it exists; it was posted earlier, now deleted, but still exists in the "sold" section of his account. I asked for a copy of that image, even offering to pay (not \$40), however, the seller would not reply. Our loss, or so I thought for four days.


Then I received an email that was quite amazing. The seller stated that he had yet another card, written by the same Keeper! The odds of that are stunning. The only difference was that the second card came from his time at Anclote Key lighthouse. He offered that if I would purchase that one (for less than the original asking price) that he would dig through his files and give me a copy of the original as well. I just couldn't pass that up. That night the deal was done, happy day! The provided image isn't the greatest, but it'll do.

To say this for a while, was a disheartening turn of events after a soaring high would be selling the experience short.



It is with great sadness that the HLPS must announce that we have lost one of our most outstanding and long-lived volunteers - Joyce Hager. She passed away in early October 2020 after suffering a severe stroke in September.

Joyce began her volunteer position in the fledgling HLPS in 2002. She soon became the gift shop manager, a position she held until 2019, when she resigned to help take better care of her ailing mother. She did maintain her position as a board member until her passing this year.

Joyce was known as a very fastidious and precise person. She maintained the gift shop and its financial records with an almost uncanny precision. She would unpack the gift shop on-site every tour, set it up, and pack it all away at the end of the day - usually alone, or occasionally with the help of another volunteer. She did this even during the hottest tour months.

Joyce was not one for the limelight, but preferred to operate in complete autonomy and remain behind the scenes. That does not mean she didn't have her own opinions. She had absolutely no problems standing on her own two feet against or for the board on specific issues she held dear.

Her husband Mike would frequently help her with the gift shop setup and tear down, but there was never any question as to who was in charge. The HLPS would like to take this opportunity to extend our sincerest condolences to Mike and thank him for playing such an important supporting role with Joyce in helping the HLPS throughout the years. Our hearts go out to you.

Although Joyce volunteered for the HLPS, that was not the extent of her generosity. She also volunteered for the Florida Reef Lights Foundation and was on their board from 2003-2020. During that period of time, she held the position of Treasurer and Membership Director. Also, she was very active in the Florida Lighthouse Association and was a District One Commissioner and often acted as the HLPS representative to the FLA. Needless to say, Joyce worked tirelessly to preserve Florida's lighthouses.

Without a shadow of a doubt, Joyce was an outstanding woman and she will be missed by many. RIP



INLET WEBCAM NEWS


For those fans of the HLPS WebCam - Good news! If you haven't already noticed, there is a new WebCam installed. After many years of operation, the old WebCam stopped working and needed to be either fixed or replaced. So, we boxed up the camera and sent it into EarthCam. After assessment, EarthCam determined that the old camera was beyond repair and it was easier to replace the camera with an updated model than to try and fix the old one.

This new camera is about 20 percent the size of the old camera, has more resolution, and has a wider field of view. Because of this, the new camera is now capable of getting the lighthouse into view! It took us about 2 weeks of fixing focus problems and adjusting the viewing angle, but we can now say that the new camera is fully operational. Enjoy.

Carrie donated her oeuvre to the Coast Guard Station, where it will hang in an appropriate space on the Hillsboro Lighthouse Point.






